We Must Watch What We Say

James 3:1-12 (NLT) ¹ Dear brothers and sisters, not many of you should become teachers in the church, for we who teach will be judged more strictly. ² Indeed, we all make many mistakes. For if we could control our tongues, we would be perfect and could also control ourselves in every other way.

- Teaching is a highly regarded profession and calling
- It is a high calling, second only to apostles and prophets
- Teachers are responsible for the spiritual lives of those they teach
- If the teacher fails to live what they teach, they face a greater judgment and condemnation
- The teacher's main tool is speech or the tongue
- We as teachers and believers offend others often with the words we say
- In many ways our words cause us to stumble, or cause others to stumble
- The more we speak, we increase our chance of offending someone with our words Proverbs 10:19 (KJV) 19 In the multitude of words there wanteth not sin: but he that refraineth his lips is wise.
- The words we say reveal how far we are from the glory of God
- But just because we often say the wrong things is not an excuse for not controlling what we say
- When we learn to control our tongue, we can control our whole body
- Our faith and spiritual maturity can be measured by how well we control our tongue
- The tongue speaks whatever is in the heart or mind, and it will justify or condemn us before God Matthew 12:34-37 (NLT)34 You brood of snakes! How could evil men like you speak what is good and right? For whatever is in your heart determines what you say. 35 A good person produces good things from the treasury of a good heart, and an evil person produces evil things from the treasury of an evil heart. 36 And I tell you this, you must give an account on judgment day for every idle word you speak. 37 The words you say will either acquit you or condemn you."

It Only Takes a Spark

- ³ We can make a large horse go wherever we want by means of a small bit in its mouth.
- ⁴ And a small rudder makes a huge ship turn wherever the pilot chooses to go, even though the winds are strong. ⁵ In the same way, the tongue is a small thing that makes grand speeches. But a tiny spark can set a great forest on fire. ⁶ And the tongue is a flame of fire. It is a whole world of wickedness, corrupting your entire body. It can set your whole life on fire, for it is set on fire by hell itself.
 - A tiny bit in a horse's mouth can cause the horse to be directed and turn the horse's whole body
 - A small rudder can guide a large ship
 - The bit and the rudder are small, but very important, if they are not controlled, the entire horse and the entire ship are out of control
 - The same is true of the tongue, it's one of the smallest parts of our body

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- The tongue is like a bit in a horse's mouth or rudder on a ship; who holds the reins or who directs the rudder of our tongues?
- But it has power to direct the course of our lives in destructive ways

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- Here are four serious problems that are sparked by the words we speak
 - 1. **Gossip** the spreading of <u>unfavorable information</u> about someone else, even if that information is **true**.
 - 2. **Slander** making a **false statement** or misrepresentation about another person that defames or damages the person's reputation.
 - 3. **Lying** When we knowingly exaggerate, misrepresent or fail to tell the whole truth.
 - 4. **Critical Speech** <u>negative comments</u> about someone that may be actually true but just doesn't need to be said.
- The destructive power of the tongue is compared to a raging fire
- When our tongues are out of control, they can cause terrible damage
- Idle and hateful words are so damaging because they spread destruction so quickly especially in the social media-driven age we live in
- The igniter of the fire is the devil
- Once the fire starts, it's hard to control
 - Wars have been started because of words
 - A few words spoken in anger can ruin a relationship
 - Promotions denied because of a slanderous review
 - An email, text, tweet, sent in jest can't be deleted and the damage has been done
- Note to self: social media, emails, text messages, etc. are forever

The Tongue No Man Can Tame

⁷ People can tame all kinds of animals, birds, reptiles, and fish, ⁸ but no one can tame the tongue. It is restless and evil, full of deadly poison.

- Every animal in the world can be tamed, can be trained, and can be controlled
- But the tongue *no man* can tame
- The tongue is unruly, restless, evil and full of deadly poison
- Poison destroys and kills anything it touches
- If no person can't control the tongue, then why bother trying?
- No man can control the tongue, but with the help of the Holy Spirit our tongue can be tamed
- Through the Holy Spirit we have access to God's power to monitor and control what we say
- The Holy Spirit's will help you say the right things and avoid saying the wrong things
- The Holy Spirit will help you consider the feelings of others when you speak
- Even if you say the wrong thing, the Holy Spirit will move you to ask for forgiveness

We Contradict Ourselves with our Speech

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- ⁹ Sometimes it praises our Lord and Father, and sometimes it curses those who have been made in the image of God. ¹⁰ And so blessing and cursing come pouring out of the same mouth. Surely, my brothers and sisters, this is not right! ¹¹ Does a spring of water bubble out with both fresh water and bitter water? ¹² Does a fig tree produce olives, or a grapevine produce figs? No, and you can't draw fresh water from a salty spring.
 - What we say can contradict who we are
 - Sometimes we can bless God our Father, at other times we curse the people whom god has created
 - At times our words right and pleasing to the ear, at other times they are coarse and destructive
 - At times our words pure and holy, and at other times they are @#!*!! (Expletive deleted)
 - As Christians we are sending out confusing signals
 - Our speech should consistently be glorifying God
 - Who are we?
 - Can fresh water and bitter water come from the same spring? Does a fig tree produce olives? Does a grapevine produce figs?
 - It is impossible to draw fresh water from a salty spring, because it would be a contradiction
 - If we can continue to speak holy things *and* hurtful things, it's no longer a contraction, it means our tongue *and* our heart are bad

Taming the Tongue

- How can we tame our tongue?
 - 1. Repent of the things you've said that were not true, mean-spirited, gossip, and slanderous
 - 2. Ask God to change your heart Matthew 12:34-36 (KJV) ³⁴ O generation of vipers, how can ye, being evil, speak good things? for out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh. ³⁵ A good man out of the good treasure of the heart bringeth forth good things: and an evil man out of the evil treasure bringeth forth evil things. ³⁶ But I say unto you, That every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment.
 - 3. Ask God to help you watch your mouth and your heart Psalm 141:3-4 (KJV) ³ "Set a watch, O LORD, before my mouth; keep the door of my lips. ⁴ Incline not my heart to any evil thing, ..."
 - 4. Allow the Holy Spirit to control what you say
 - a. One fruit of the Spirit is temperance or self-control
 - b. The Holy Spirit will help you *learn* self-control
 - T.H.I.N.K. before you speak, THINK: T--ls it <u>true</u>? H--ls it <u>helpful</u>? I--ls it <u>inspiring</u>? N--ls it <u>necessary</u>? K--ls it <u>kind</u>?
 - 6. Glorify God through the things you say **Ephesians 4:29 (KJV)** ²⁹ **Let no corrupt** communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers.
